BIOGRAPHICAL/HISTORICAL: Harry Dunn (1909-2004), a resident of Winchester, died at age 95. A graduate of John Handley High School and the former Shenandoah Academy, Dunn was active in the community as a member of the Civil War Round Table, Winchester Exchange Club, the Winchester Frederick County Historical Society, and member of Christ Episcopal Church.

Further information: Robert Portner Brewing Co. was a pre-Prohibition brewery in Alexandria, VA, according to Harry Dunn, this was preparations for "Homecoming Week, Sept. 14-19, 1908."
- [129-047] Baseball game at the old ballpark on the west side of South Stewart Street. "Looking toward Stewart Street in Winchester, a centerfielder had this view of a long-ago baseball game in what is now the Briarmont Drive area. W. Alexander (Sandy) Baker's team used the field. So did the team from Winchester High School, later Handley High School." No persons identified, circa 1900s.
- [129-048] Rouss Fire Company motorized fire truck, with solid tires and carbide lamps. Parked in interior of Rouss Fire Hall. Driver identified as Ollie Vance; man standing to his right identified as Bill Toddy. Third man unidentified due to sun glare obscuring head. Dog appears to be a bull terrier or pit bull with clipped ears, circa 1920s.
- [129-049] Fourth of July Celebration. North Loudoun Street illuminated and decorated. Baetjer & Co. (120 North Loudoun - clothing and yard goods), Masonic Temple (118 North Loudoun) and both Keller's (116 North Loudoun) and Miller's (110 North Loudoun) Hardware. Date uncertain but prior to 1912 - flags have fewer than 48 stars, circa 1908.

- [129-053] Trick photograph showing Will Toddy in two places at the same time. Mr. Toddy worked at the Barr Studio, where he learned how to obtain effects like this, circa 1920-1981.
- [129-054] Newspaper clipping (from Winchester Star) of J. Thomas Boyd on police motorcycle. Later became Winchester Chief of Police, circa 1926.
- [129-055] 7 members of the Rouss Fire Company on and around horse drawn steam pumper named "Little Napoleon."
