### **EXISTENCE AND LOCATION OF ORIGINALS:** Bayarian State Archives

**SCOPE AND CONTENT**: Miscellaneous Manuscript Files (MMF) are small collections typically containing only a folder or two of materials. This folder contains photocopies and transcriptions of the diary of Johan (or Joseph) E. Prechtel, a Hessian prisoner of war during the American Revolution. The diary covers the entire period of the Hessian prisoners' captivity in Winchester from November 1781to January 1782. Prechtel records the deaths of numerous Hessian prisoners, as well as some who deserted to American and French military units, during this time. Included are German and English language transcriptions of the diary.

**BIOGRAPHICAL/HISTORICAL**: Johan (or Joseph) E. Prechtel was a Hessian prisoner of war during the American Revolution. After the British surrender at Yorktown, he was among some 3,000 prisoners of war, including close to one thousand German auxiliaries commonly known as Hessians, who were marched from Yorktown to Winchester. Arriving in November 1781, Prechtel and his fellow prisoners had to build new barracks to provide themselves with winter shelter. In January 1782, the Hessians were moved to Fredericktown (now Frederick), Maryland to new quarters where they remained until granted their freedom by an act of Congress in April 1783.
