

On February 4th, the Bowman Library hosted the Northern Shenandoah Valley Master Gardener Association for an *Indoor Plant Clinic*. 

Across the Many Years

Salvaged from an old house by the new owners and delivered to the Archives for preservation were letters written by James Loy to Rena Keckly during World War I.

In the letter to the left, dated January 1st, 1918, James writes from Camp Funston, Kansas, where he was training for deployment to Europe with an Engineer Regiment. During his training, James was one of many soldiers and civilians who becoame ill from the "Spanish Flu". He recovered and was deployed to France. After returning from the War, he and Rena married and had one child while living in Winchester.

In Memory

Donations for the *Jean Wilson Memorial Fund* for the Clarke County Library closed on February 29th. Community donations totaled \$620 to be used for the purchase of children's books and Launchpads in her memory.
