### *National Library Week Celebrated in April*

### *Library Continues to Expand Notary Services*

You certainly don't need one everyday. But when you need to sign a legal document, take an oath, or give oral or written testimony, it's of the utmost importance that you can find a notary to verify your identity. Responding to this community need the library has slowly been increasing the number of staff members who are commissioned as a Notary Public by the State of Virginia. For a number of years there was only one staff member at Handley who could provide notary services. Now there are three at Handley. Bowman Library has two with a third staff member expecting to be commissioned in May. Clarke County Library has one notary to serve patrons.



### *Awareness and Prevention*



Thanks to the efforts of Handley Youth Services Manager Katie Moss, our community partnerships are expanding and growing stronger each month. This April, through our connection with Healthy Families of Northern Shenandoah Valley, the Handley Library branch was able to be a partner site for a Pinwheel Garden. The outdoor "Pinwheels for Prevention" is intended to help raise awareness during National Child Abuse Prevention Month. Indoors, and year round the Library provides referral information for services provided through Healthy Families.

## *Orrick Cemetery 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary*

The Black History Task Force, sponsored by the Stewart Bell Jr. Archives, met at Orrick Cemetery, 501 S. Braddock, to recognize the 100<sup>th</sup>. Anniversary of its incorporation. Taskforce members placed flowers at the graves of Rober Orrick, owner of the property, and the men who signed the deed of incorporation in 1922, providing a cemetery for the African American community in the Winchester area.




## *Apple Blossom Veterans Dinner*

Then going in a very different direction it will work with Clarke County Social Services to present “Instant Family” a film about adoption.



## *A Mishap Becomes An Opportunity*



On Thursday, April 21<sup>st</sup>, dripping was heard, and a leak was discovered in The Archives at Handley Library. Carolyn Bly and Dennis Ball of the Facilities Department responded immediately. The water was contained with towels, then collections and shelves were moved to allow plumbers access the problem. April 22<sup>nd</sup>, additional leaks were discovered in other areas of the Lower Level and the first floor. A break in the sewer line had occurred. Bathrooms were closed, the water was turned off, and the decision was made to close the building.

The closure provided an unexpected opportunity. The Handley Youth Services Department was able to complete a months-long weeding, withdrawing, and shifting project of the Juvenile Nonfiction and Biography collections. Materials are now spread out with more intentional “face out” display space that allows for easier browsing at kid eye-levels. Originally scheduled for after hours, the project was able to be completed that Friday thanks to Alyssa Grant, Pam Eichhorst, and Rachael Hirsch, and Amanda Henry who stayed to help

New Scannx credit card payment machines have been installed at Clarke County and Handley libraries along with new self-check equipment in the Handley Library Youth Services Department. All the while, working on the design and development of a new website for the library.
