Rising Kindergarteners were honored for getting ready to start school in the Fall, just like in Brantley-Newton's books. Vice Mayor Hill and other local



celebrities were on hand to acknowledge our community's love of reading and to encourage and support our young patrons.

## Always Collecting, Always Sharing

Over the summer the Archives received 576 Research Visits, 476 Requests for Manuscripts, and 115 Remote Requests for research, reference, and reproduction services. One Research Visit involved two groups from the Blue Ridge Environmental Governors School. Each received a tour of the Archives and a presentation related to their track. The presentations included the challenges of analog and digital preservation with one group and the importance of correspondence as a historical resource with the other. students. The items are used to help people understand how media formats have changed and the challenges this presents to Archivists who need to preserve audio and film materials.



## Program Partnership with the Handley 100<sup>th</sup>

#### Something New in Reserving Books and Media

The HRLS Technical Services Department has begun using catalog records for books and media that are still "on-order". When an item is purchased, our ILS (Integrated Library System) now automatically links the order to a catalog record. This allows patrons to place holds on popular new titles before they are



released and helps staff by reducing the number of redundant purchase requests for popular titles. It also helps staff to identify titles with longer holds lists and to prioritize cataloging of materials.



## A Book-and-Bake Sale

Always innovating, always providing support. This summer in between sponsoring musical events and trips to fabulous destinations, the Friends found new sources of book donations, added "Baked Goods" to the Summer Sale and raised over \$12,000.00 to support Library programs and provide educational opportunities for staff members.
